

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

MEASURE D AHEAD OF

San Luis Obispo High School announced this past Monday their most recent progress on Measure D construction, with construction coordinator and wood teacher Jed Bruington expressing high remarks for the recent projects.

"After two years of demolition projects and preliminary construction planning, we are proud to announce that we have successfully finished our first two dirt piles," said Bruington in a press conference with reporters, parents, and students on campus.

Measure D, short for Measure Destruction-Without-Any-Actual-Progress-Or-Benefits-At-All, was a ballot

measure originally passed in 2016 as a major allocation of local funds to improve SLOHS's campus. 

With two successful dirt piles already completed, SLOHS is hoping to add at least three more dirt piles by 2019, close off half of their parking lot by 2020, and even dig out a huge empty pit behind the new gym by 2022.





Measure D may remove all our foliage, but administration graciously left a lovely reminder of what used to be: the stump of the Big Tree.


