New Cal Regs

All seniors planning to enter the University of California during 1961-62 who have signed up for a scholarship will have to meet the following requirements:

1. Besides filing a Scholarship application form by Mar. 1, 1961, the student must take the Scholastic Aptitude Test not later than Feb. 4, 1961.

2. Students must register for the Feb. 4 test not later than Jan. 7, 1961 (or Jan. 21 if a \$3.00 late registration fee is paid), with the Educational Testing Service, Box 21 If a \$3.00 late registration fee is paid), with the Educational Testing Service, Box 27896, Los Angeles 27, California. If the student applies for a scholarship at more than one campus of the University of California, he should have the test scores sent to the Admissions Office on each campus.


3. Students will be required to file a College Scholarship Service form with the College Scholarship Service. This form contains instructions regarding its return to the College Scholarship Service.




